What was the nicest thing somebody did for you?

They did my hair for me

One of my best friends brought enough snacks to last the entire group for a few days! She got and shared literally everything; cookie dough balls (gives you a sigh high), sweets, gummies, toffees, granary bars, fruit pots, chocolate-caramel energy bars... all but to name a few.

It was my birthday – so all my friends singing to me at the campsite!

Shining a torch on me so I could finish cooking and eating my pastas when it was pitch black was the nicest thing somebody did for me

The nicest thing was probably when we all shared snacks.

What will you remember the most in 20 year's time?

Laughing with my friends and groups.

In 20 years' time, I will never forget the agony my entire body suffered through. This will be a reminder to never go camping, ever again, for the rest of my life.

I will remember in 20 years' time how this expedition gave me confidence and new skills.

All being lost in the woods and trying to play games to distract ourselves from realising we had no idea where we were!

By being able to enter the wilderness and explore new places whilst developing our skills and attitudes was something that we are all very grateful to have experienced and are looking forward to the upcoming Assessed Expedition. But that's not to say that everything went according to plan - getting lost, becoming soaked in the rain and intense physical tiredness were all problems that we faced together, but to overcome these issues and continue going ahead was key to our success.

Overall, through the positive moments and the negative ones, through the sunshine and through the rain, and through the open fields and the never-ending woods came a once-in-a-lifetime chance to embark on a crazy yet rewarding experience that is the Bronze DofE Practice Expedition at Grey Court. 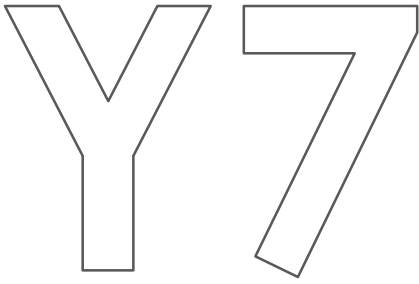
You will need to be detailed with your application and as places are limited you may want to start considering:

Exam Season - Ode to Mother Stoyanova!

In 1989 when I took my exams - life was simple - Banarama's "Cruel Summer" was flying high in the charts, GCSEs had replaced O-levels as intellectual currency, we'd been dismissed to "revise" at Easter, I sported a back perm and the Berlin Wall was still up!

The role of an exams officer was also a tad less complicated too in that - they usually took the form of a teacher nearing retirement who had completed national service in their youth. They characteristically smoked Golden Virginia roll ups and wore an air of general flatulent disinterest. Every student was squeezed into a single exam hall with a polished parquet floor, dominated by the ticking of a large analogue clock. Air conditioning meant the windows were open. Invigilators took the form of day-dreaming teachers who paced up and down reading their copies of "the Daily Mirror" and "The Guardian." They took great delight in flicking my ear lobes or swapping crossword clues as I wrestled with quadratic equations.

When I shared this nostalgic memory with Grey Court's sickle welding workers' champion of exams, Ms Zhulieta Stoyanova - she downed her seventh Nespresso capsule of the morning. Uttering a sigh more expansive than a state-planned wheat field on a collective farm in the Danubian plain, she opined that "as you were taking your exams, Comrade Clements, I was in fact completing National Service in Bulgaria's Rila mountain range as part of a workers' party building a state commissioned hydro-electric dam and subsisting on three hours sleep a night and a mouthful of bulgar wheat.

Although I was tempted to reply, "What a load of Uncle Bulgaria," this iron curtained hardship has evidently prepared Ms Stoyanova, perfectly for our own state sponsored 5 week plan: the modern exam season - which certainly feels trickier than overseeing the centralist strategy of a small communist state.

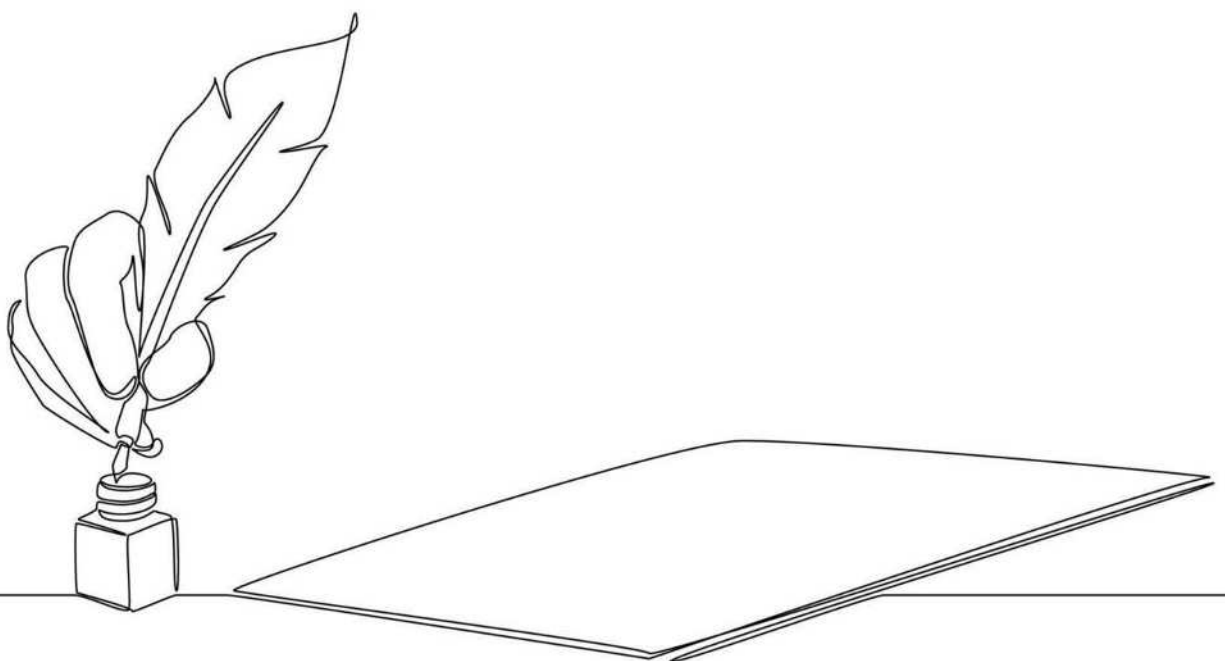
So the current season (ordeal!) involves organising around 420 pupils to sit an average of 9 subjects, comprising at least 2 papers and several tiers, in a total of 15 different gyms, halls, computer suites, small rooms and offices. Then there's the types of exams: BTEC, Vcerts, GCSE, A-levels - served by multiple exam boards with differing submission days, varying (and nefarious) rules, small print and addendums to absorb; overseen by an exams service, Ofqual, that might declare an inspection from the exam commissar at any minute!

In terms of technology - an inclusive culture requires computers for those who type, enlarged papers and audio records for the spoken language exams (we host 60 community languages) and multiple, staggered and adapted start and finish times - all of which have to be tracked. All this requires separate log-ins, blocked internet connections and state-of the art security to protect the reams of exam papers that are delivered, downloaded and couriered to her office and marked "Top Secret!"

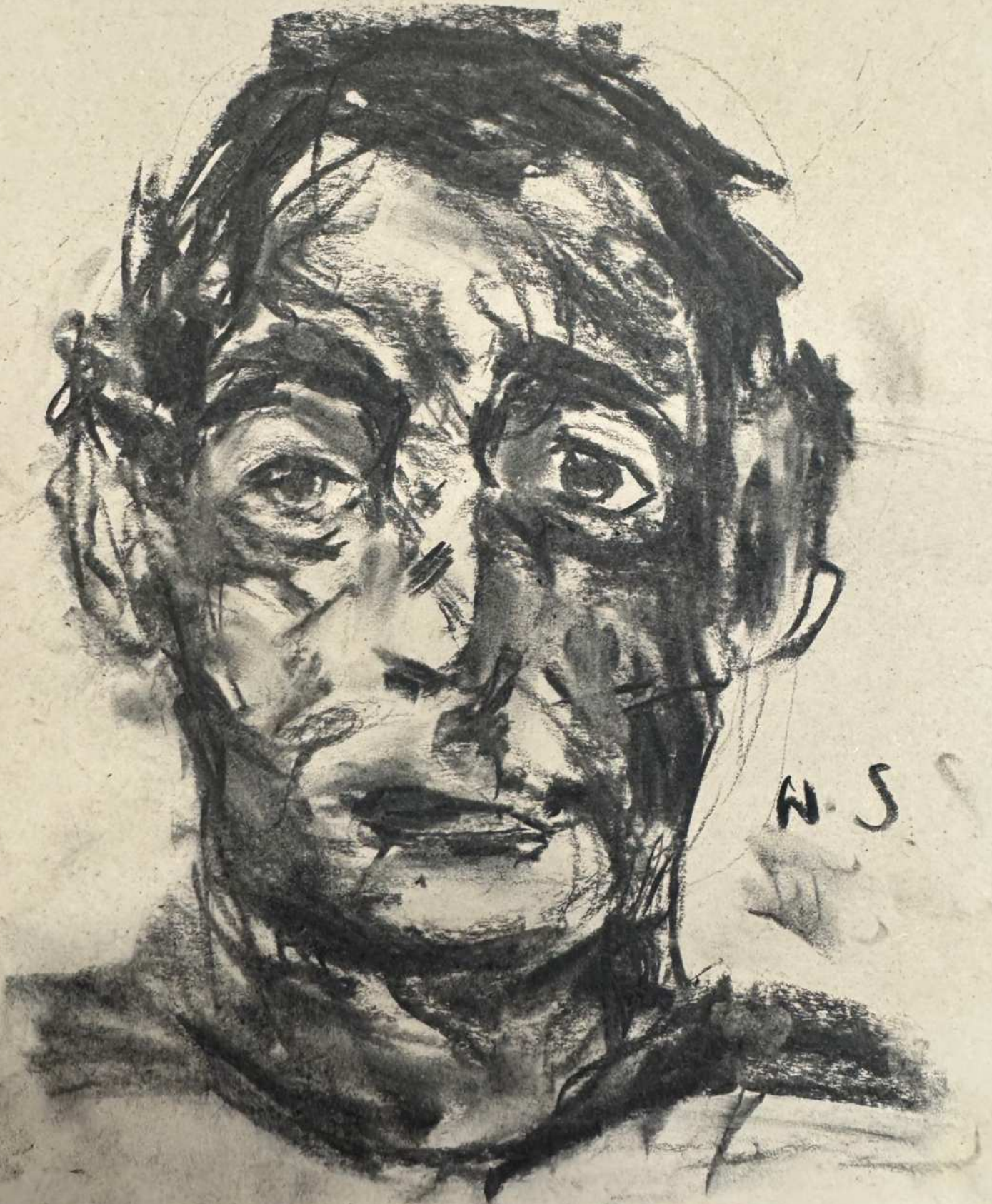
And essential to the carefully choreographed exam routine are the wonderful invigilators (a truly diverse collective) who hail from Ham, Kingston, Italy, Egypt, Ecuador, Russia, Spain and even New Malden. But these comrades need, orchestrating and organising so they can oversee a system that has to be wary of all manner of potential rule breaches from smart phones and wireless watches to hidden cameras, old fashioned notes and invisible ink!

So if - in the next week, Ham street is blocked by an articulated lorry with Bulgarian number plates, you will observe that it is delivering a large steel social realist style sculpture of Mother Stoyanova, guardian of exams, protector of academic integrity and the architect of this year's success (hopefully)..

You will find it dominating the Grey Court skyline - as although in our school we adhere to the communist themed adage that "All animals are equal...Ms Stoyanova...for 5 weeks of the year at least...is definitely more equal than others!"

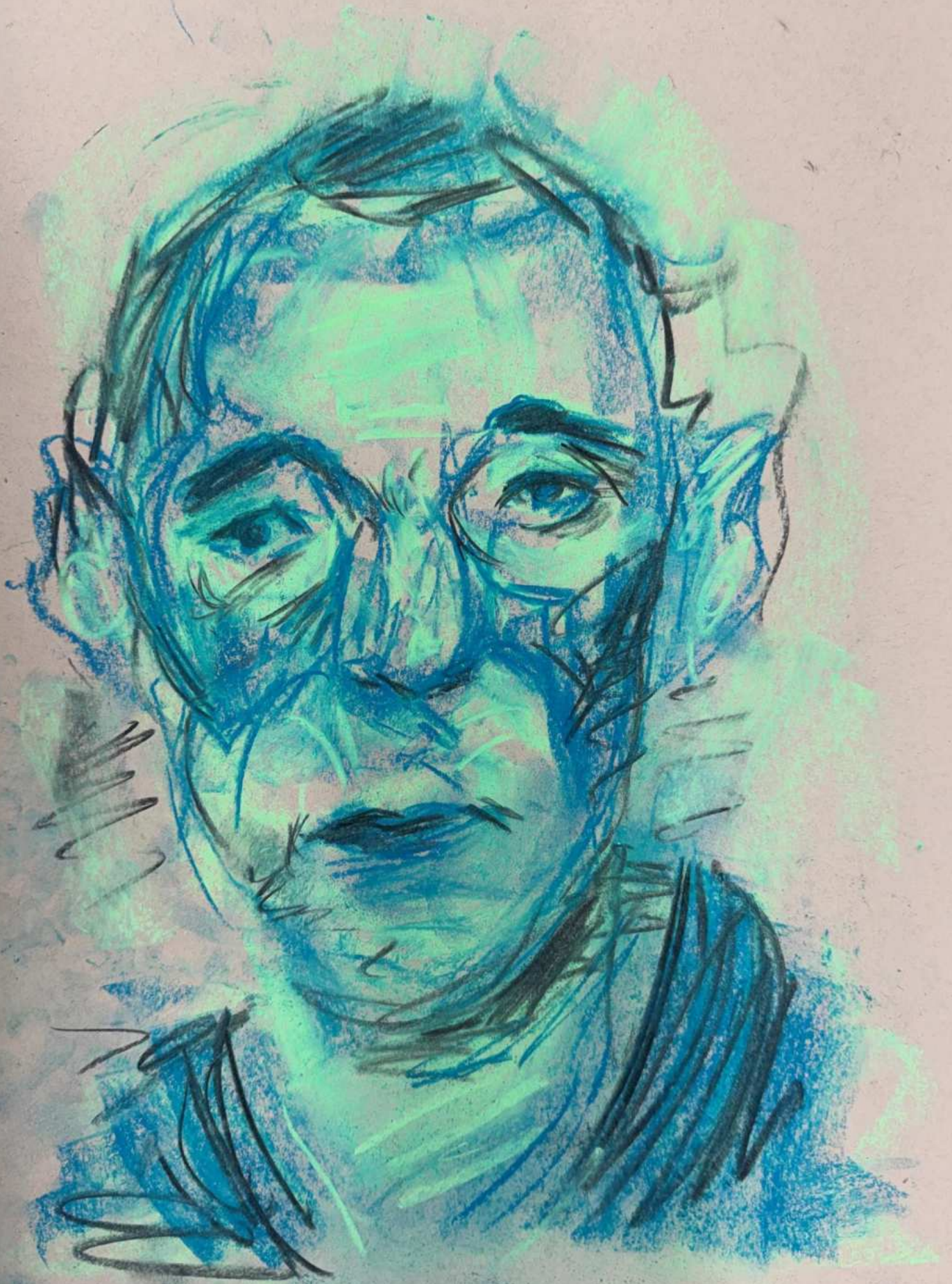

Trial Exams

Wednesday 17 June to Friday 26 June

These results will be used to give predicted grades for UCAS applications. A reminder that students will be given the grade above what they achieve in their trial exams. For example, BCC will become ABB.

Students will have a final attempt at improving their predicted grades for UCAS in September. Students are only allowed to pick one set of results, either the summer trial exams, or the September trial exams. They cannot mix and match.

Tutors and the sixth form team will be supporting students with writing the best possible personal statement to show off their considerable skills and talents.

Students should be adding course choices as they complete their university and course searches.

Students will need to attend an assigned session in Activity week to begin preparation for their project and create their summer work plan.

When you are making your choices you should base your decision for your firm choice of the course you most want to study. When choosing an insurance choice it should be a course with a lower offer (but you are still happy to study). This will mean that if you miss your grades for your firm choice you will still be given a place on your insurance course and won't have to go through the Clearing process in August.

Even if you are unsure of your course or considering a gap year you should apply now to prevent delay later.

If you have a disability, including ASD, ADHD, dyslexia etc you should also apply for Disabled Students' Allowance (DSA) as you may be eligible for extra funding for equipment and adaptations.

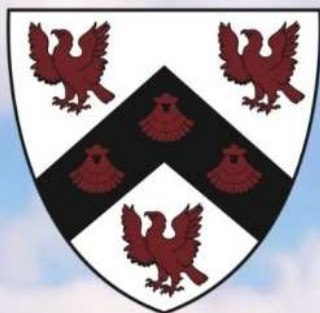

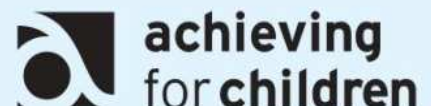
