## Stephen Lawrence Day, Brutalist architecture, Thatching and Learning Conversations



#### Stephen Lawrence Day

Over the course of this week and next students across the school will be given the opportunity in form time to honour the legacy of Stephen Lawrence through acts of remembrance and celebration. The conviction of George Floyd's killer in the past week which has focused the minds of students on issues around policing, dis-

crimination and racial justice, highlights the continuing presence of Stephen Lawrence's racially motivated murder and the long search for justice. As a consequence of Ms Comrie's advocacy alongside the work around diversity that has been promoted by students, staff and alumni of the school, we have decided to raise the profile of this event, especially as Stephen Lawrence's death is now outside the shared experience of a generation of students.

Indeed, as 28 years have now passed, since Lawrence - a sixth former - was killed at a bus stop in Eltham, it has made me recollect how as a young PGCE student, I delivered a lesson on how his killing was constructed in the tabloid media all those years ago. What was striking at the time was the untouchable hubris displayed by his killers as they initially evaded justice. The poet Benjamin Zephaniah adeptly captured this arrogance in his poem "What Stephen Lawrence taught us" when he described how "we watch them strut before us/As proud as sick Mussolinis." The English department has encouraged Y10 students to reflect on this



imagery over the past week through the study of Zephaniah's emotionally charged work.

By encouraging students to engage in learning related to the social injustices that contributed to Lawrence's death and its aftermath we are building on work on the murder itself that is being delivered by the history department to Y8 students. We will also be studying sections from David Olusoga's student friendly "Black and British: a short essential history" in the Summer and Autumn terms.

What is probably most striking about Stephen Lawrence's legacy is how his parents Doreen (now Baroness) and Neville Lawrence became advocates for social change and British civil rights. They are examples of how "ordinary" people can facilitate profound cultural change. Inspired by their examples we will be launching a house competition in the next few weeks where we will promote ways in which students can actively become advocates for social reform and innovation across a range of areas.

## In class support and guidance week for Y11 and Y13 students

It has been a pleasure to welcome Y11 and Y13 students after the Easter break and both year groups should be commended for the purposeful manner in which they have approached their studies with attendance in our Y11 intervention sessions breaking previous records. Y11 students really have rolemodelled outstanding behaviour and standards to their peers in the lower school.

With the passport sessions and the assessment season starting on Thursday 6 May we have set aside next week as a time when teachers can engage in one-to-one academic conversations with students. Commencing on the 26 April we will hold an in class support and guidance week whereby teachers will hold one-to-one meetings with each student they teach to provide them with personalised guidance and next steps so that each student is prepared for their assessment. As part of this meeting the teacher will also give indications of current and potential performance by the end of the course.

The forthcoming assessments will form part of a portfolio of classwork, coursework and past mock examinations that enable our teachers to award Teaching Assessment Grades that represent a holistic, objective judgement based on evidence. Traditionally it is at this juncture in the academic year when student performance peaks so we hope the guidance week will accelerate opportunities for students to maximise their performance. Moreover, students should be reassured that we are not basing performance solely on these assessments.

We have now put in place access arrangements for all students who require them. In any given year some students also put in for special consideration or mitigating circumstances that could impact upon their performance in the assessments. The criteria for special consideration is laid out by JCQ in JCQ – A guide to the special consideration process, with effect from 1 September 2020

#### Letter to parents and carers

Parents/Carers are advised to inform the exam's officer of any reasons for special consideration or mitigating circumstances prior to the assessment window as we will need to award a grade based on evidence produced by students when applying special considerations. However, please note special consideration cannot be applied due to lost teaching and learning as we will take this into account when awarding final grades.

There is a great deal of reporting in the media about the impact of the pandemic on young people's education which has amplified fears and anxieties about student prospects. I would like to reassure parents and carers that the current generation of Sixth Form students are the most resilient and autonomous group we have yet taught whilst the outcomes and university offers provided to our last Y13 cohort was the best in our school's history. I am optimistic that this upward trend will continue for Y11 and Y13 leavers this year.

Whilst we appreciate that students may feel anxious about the process of awarding grades and about sitting further assessments, I would like to draw your attention to JCQ's guidance about malpractice. JCQ states that students, or other individuals acting on their behalf, must not try and influence schools or their staff to gain an unfair advantage such as fabricating evidence, plagiarism or inappropriately applying pressure onto teachers. This could be deemed as malpractice, and pending an investigation, could lead to sanctions being imposed by JCQ. With this in mind, we are asking students and parents to be mindful of their tone and communication with our staff regarding student performance. Please also note, it is also classed as malpractice if Teacher Assessment Grades are released by schools before 10 August so we will not be sharing these grades until this date

On a final note, looking beyond the guidance week and assessments, we intend to celebrate the end of the Y11 and Y13s time with us in mid-June as the relaxing of Covid restrictions means that we can facilitate this important rites of passage. We will also be running an onsite "bridging" school for Y11 students in June so the transition to Sixth Form is smooth and stress free. I will provide information about these "festivities" in a separate letter next week.

#### **Clematis Montana**

Being the Emperor of Rome certainly proved to be quite exhausting last term especially with regards to the unprecedented wave of success provided by the staff and citizens of Roman House in events such as The Tanzania challenge, the secret life of pets and football rounders. I therefore retreated to my allotment to cultivate my Clematis Montana over the holiday and for a while this habitat proved to be a bucolic balm. However, like many students as the new term approached - and faced with the prospect of fighting a pandemic, advocating social justice and marking Marxist feminist-eco-critical -Freudian critiques of Emily Dickenson's poetry - I did feel a sense of trepidation as the new term approached. This was exasperated and almost became a fully formed panic attack last Sunday when a surprise phone call from Chris at the local stables - offering me a freshly squeezed delivery of prime horse manure on Monday evening- meant that had a real dilemma: should I celebrate my wife's birthday or collect the holy grail of fertilizers?

To ease any Sunday night anxieties I might have felt, I spent my time concocting a "Tess of the d'Urbervilles miscellany quiz" around chapter 35 to 46. This was because I suspected that some of my Y12 students 1. wouldn't have read this section of the text, and 2. would in all probability stagger into class at 8.45am blinking like a sleepy hedgehog who has been disturbed by a

careless gardener overturning a compost heap. Sadly, in both cases I was right.

However, this week's star of the week must go to Y12 student Josh Povey who on answering the question: Why did Tess's mother's country cottage need re-thatching- (it was saturated by Autumn rains) demonstrated a hitherto untapped knowledge of thatching! 

#### The sixth form drama group were

lucky enough to be introduced by Mr Page to the actor **Toby Jones** who is probably best known to younger audiences for his work as the voice of Dobby the Elf in the Harry Potter films and as the announcer Claudius Templesmith in the film adaptation of The Hunger Games. However, the award winning stage and screen actor has also appeared in loads of things including Captain America, Tintin, Elizabeth 1,

It was an honour to be able to ask, talk, and laugh with such a well-regarded actor as Toby Jones, which has helped us as Drama students to gain a deeper understanding of the acting industry.

thinks about acting/performing/the industry/theatre and film, and I gained many cool nuggets of information about the professional acting field that you would never really think about. He gave his thoughts on going into the industry that's not solely practical (like advice you get from most acting Q&A sessions), such as always reminding yourself that the work never ends and that you're never really out of work as an actor, and that a lot of the work is just observing life and the world around you and how you or others react to certain situations/emotions. He also gave me permission to realise that it's really cool to follow your own path and go into a career that is often deemed as a hobby. He made me

realise that pursuing my own career path, no matter what others may think, is a really powerful thing and has made me even more confident and



excited about going out into the world trying to become an actor and develop my craft.

We will discuss: college choices, writing an excellent personal statement, taking an EPQ and preparing for preinterview tests.

#### **EPQ**

As the Y13 have now completed their EPQ, it is time for Y12 students to begin the process. At this first stage, the project is open to all interested students. It is an additional AS qualification which comes with the associated UCAS points and can be an excellent way to improve your skills for university and can often increase your chances of securing a university place. I will be placing an introductory set of slides on google classroom for all Y12 to view and for tutors to show in registration. Students will then need to sign up and complete some initial tasks prior to half term to be accepted onto the course.




