Anyone who has watched Dragons Den will be familiar with the format. A team of hopeful entrepreneurs present their wonderful idea to a tough judging panel and hope not to be destroyed by the process. The sixth form equivalent is the Young Enterprise company programme, where students have just two terms to set up a limited company, open a business bank account, sell shares, devise their product, research and test it and generate sales out of thin air before submitting their results to a panel of industry experts to be judged.

Those brave enough to enter the challenge this year were the plucky crew of Alex, Anbarin, Edie, James, Mo, Sacha and Sofya (pictured).

Their product - www.kinviaconnect.com - aims to be a kinder, social connection platform than current market players and was borne from watching students isolated and locked away in halls of residence in unfamiliar cities.

Kinviaconnect.com is being marketed at universities as a way of helping boost the mental health provision to students in a proactive, preventative way.

This seemed to impress the judges. Four of the team were cross examined by industry experts from NPL, financial services and a digital transformation specialist company.... a tough panel with equally tough questions.

They faced tough competition with three different teams from St Paul's boys school and one from Lady Eleanor Holles who, between them, had many more sales under their belts. However, the early stage conversations with universities impressed the judges, ensuring that Grey Court's team - Kinvia - scooped the top spot on the night.

Next up, this team of budding Zuckerbergs face the area finals where they will compete against the winning teams from Kingston, Croydon and Merton Boroughs, among others.

It has been wonderful to have the students back in school after the Easter break and to see so many attending extra-curricular clubs. #Y11 Bridging School 14-25 June 2021

Last year, we ran a well-received and comprehensive Virtual bridging school as a consequence of the COVID pandemic. The impact of the initiative has been noticeable as it provided Y11s with prelearning opportunities and has accelerated the progress of many of the students who are now in Y12.

Our intention this year is to make the school a 'real time" physical experience. Students will be invited to attend 4 hours of lessons for each of their THREE subjects choices across two weeks in mid-June. This experience will be accompanied by an "enrichment" afternoon where they can partake in an array of extracurricular and sporting activities. We will also run induction assemblies and an extended study skills tutorial. Students will get to use and inhabit the Sixth Form building and enjoy the cuisine in the Sixth Form café.

The initiative is open to all students who have indicated in their interviews that Grey Court is their first choice sixth form. The materials will be made available online after the event for students who cannot attend or who may have applied elsewhere. At this point we would recommend that students who have opted to study with other institutions contact their provider so they are aware of any inductions sessions, portfolios, summer work or bridging activities that may be required as part of their chosen institution's acceptance criteria. We have also produced resources designed to aid the transition of Year 11 students into colleges, schools and the work-place which Ms Corrighan will make available as part of our careers programme at the end of the final assessment window.

A Google form will be sent to Y11 students in the next fortnight so they can indicate whether they would like to attend the bridging school which we hope will begin to alleviate any concerns about "lost learning2 as a consequence of the pandemic."





October, October by Katya Balen

A classic in the making for anyone who ever longed to be WILD.



October and her dad live in the woods. They sleep in the house Dad built for them and eat the food they grow in the vegetable patches. They know the trees and the rocks and the lake and stars like best friends. They read the books they buy in town again and again until the pages are soft and yellow. They live in the woods and they are wild. And that's the way it is. Until the year October turns eleven. That's the year October rescues a baby owl. It's the year Dad falls out of the biggest tree in their woods. And The year a woman who calls herself October's mother comes back in their lives. The year that everything changes.

Written in Balen's heart-stoppingly beautiful style, this book is a feast for the senses, filled with the woodsmoke smell of crisp autumn mornings and the sound of wellies squelching in river mud. And, as October fights to find the space to be wild in the whirling chaos of the world beyond the woods, it is also a feast for the soul.

Katya Balen is co-director of Mainspring Arts, a not-for-profit that supports neurodivergent and autistic people to access creative opportunities. She studied English at university, and completed an MA researching the impact of stories on autistic children's behaviour. When she's not writing books or funding applications, she's busy trying to coax her ridiculous rescue dog to go for a walk. Her debut children's novel *Space We're In* published by Bloomsbury in 2019 and was selected as the Sunday Times Children's Book of the Week as well as being shortlisted for the Branford Boase award. Her second novel, *October*, was published in 2020 to widespread acclaim and was again selected as the Times Children's Book of the Week.

Healthy relationships and social media strategies

Review of Mind presentation on "Healthy Relationships" to Year 12/13 students by Martha Johnson Baily - Year 13

In light of the tragic death of Sarah Everard, many women have taken to social media to share their experiences of sexual assault. Inspired by these stories and testimonies, the student leadership team met and discussed what we as a community can do to encourage education and promote awareness about these issues. We thought it would be beneficial to hear from an outside speaker so asked Ms Higham about the possibility of arranging a talk. On Wednesday as part of enrichment, both year 12 &13 had a virtual talk from the charity Mind regarding sexual harassment. The speakers were very informative and talked through various concepts such as consent and healthy relationships. It was very powerful to hear from a victim of sexual assault about her experiences. As part of the talk, we also heard from a police officer who talked us through the law in relation to sexual harassment. We are grateful to have had the opportunity to hear from the speakers. It is important as young men and women that we start conversations, challenge unacceptable behaviours and encourage a change in attitude regarding sexual harassment.

Many thanks to Mind for delivering this excellent and very powerful presentation; to the Sixth Formers for engaging with the process in a mature and proactive fashion, and to Martha for eloquently reviewing its impact.

The content of the presentation was discussed by the *Diversity Group this week with Liberty Kausmally Rattagan from year 10 providing us with a very insightful, mature and measured student perspective on her experiences of online and school based activism. Liberty also reflected on how recent debates around sexual harassment and race have elicited emotive and sometimes aggressive responses from audiences and individuals, which has often caused offense and has felt disproportionate.*

As a next step the diversity group is constructing a series of presentations designed around helping students to understand how social issues are presented in the media, and the extent to which news sources are filtered/censored and legitimised/quality assured. The intention is to provide students with the critical tools to responsibly use and consume media content especially social media content. With this intention in mind we intend to draw up some <u>guidelines</u> and strategies for students to adopt when producing and consuming media content.

Ms James would like to create more spaces and forums in the school where students can have a "voice" and be "heard" but we intend to work with students on ways in which they can adopt negotiated and nuanced readings of texts where necessary rather than blunt oppositional stances.

Finally, we intend to follow up the *Mind presentation with some more work with students about their legal rights, and the laws relating to situations they most likely encounter as they travel through their teenage years. The focus will be on sexual offences, specifically 'sexting' and sexual communication and coercion/consent.*

This work is intended to provide students with knowledge and strategies to look out for and look after one another. It is very energising listening to the views and ideas of teachers and students who speak in the diversity group as their proactivity generates collective change.

Sixth Form

Y13 Study Leave/Passport

Y13 lessons will officially end on Thursday, 6 May, when the assessment window commences for Y11 and Y13 students. The first Y13 assessment (psychology) is scheduled for Tuesday, 11 May. However, in order to provide continued support through the process, Y13 teachers will be available to teach "passport" style sessions up until the date of their scheduled Y13 assessment. These sessions may involve whole class teaching, intensive small group revision sessions or individual Q and A style conversations. Attendance is not compulsory at these sessions as at this point in the year many students want the option of being able to revise at home.

Due to the fact that many classes are re-roomed because of the assessment schedule at this time of year teachers will meet students in the sixth form library at the beginning of scheduled lessons and then take them to a spare room if the normal teaching room is being used. If rooming is changed this will be posted on the "stream" section of Google-classroom.

Summer Term Enrichment Programme

In response to 'Everyone's Invited', our 'Transition to Adulthood' workshops started this week with a session on Sexual Harassment. Student feedback from head girl, Martha Johnston-Bailey:

Ms Fincham's Oxbridge and EPQ Update

Many of our Oxbridge hopefuls attended the meeting about the Oxbridge process which included an opportunity to read a selection of personal statements from previously successful Grey Court candidates. Students can now use these to start drafting possible content for their statements as their applications need to be ready before the rest of the cohort for final submission by the 15 October. Students were also sent the link to the Kings' Wimbledon introductory presentation on the Oxbridge process. This means they should now be fully armed with the core knowledge of how to proceed with their application over the next 7 months. Further one to one meetings will be arranged in the coming weeks to support students on an individual basis.

EPQ

An impressive 76 Y12 students have expressed an interest in completing an EPQ this year. They have all been sent an invitation to join the google classroom and now have an

introductory form to fill by half term to outline their possible area of interest and to confirm some commitment to the course. Further tasks will be set after half term to get the projects underway. If students are to manage this additional AS alongside their other subject requirements, it is important that they complete some preliminary planning and research over the summer term in order to be ready for September.

MedSoc

Students are now receiving support with writing their personal statements. Each student has also been given guidance on what they should be looking out for during their work experiences. Recently, students completed a presentation highlighting topics of relevance to them. The quality of presentations were very high with one group's presentation containing excellent examples of Medical Ethics and role plays. Students will not get tailored support for writing their personal statement and make them relevant to their work experiences.



Self Care Briefing – Mild to Moderate Hay-fever



Rationale

Mild to moderate havfever and other allergic symptoms can be managed by avoiding triggers or taking medications. If treatment is needed, a wide range of medication can be purchased from community pharmacies and supermarkets. These medications are usually less expensive than a prescription and can be purchased without seeing a GP.

Recommendations for clinicians

- Provide the patient with a 'non-prescription' sheet or a patient information leaflet to promote education about self-limiting conditions suitable for self-care when appropriate. See: https://www.nhs.uk/conditions/hay-fever/
- Advise patients of safe and effective self-care measures:
 - Consult a pharmacist for advice as to which treatment is most suitable
 - Wear wraparound sunglasses to stop pollen getting into your eyes and use petroleum jelly around the nostrils to trap pollen
 - Stay indoors whenever possible
 - Vacuum regularly and dust as much as possible. Pollen filters for air vents in the car and special filters for the vacuum cleaner can help.
 - > Shower and change your clothes after you've been outside
- Patients should seek medical attention if:
 - Experiencing wheezing, breathlessness or tightness in their chest
 - > Pregnant or breastfeeding
 - > Hay fever symptoms are not relieved by over the counter treatment in combination with measures to reduce exposure to pollen
 - > The pattern of symptoms seems unusual or diagnosis is uncertain
 - > An over the counter corticosteroid nasal spray has been used for longer than 3 months

Example of products available to buy over the counter*

Loratadine- not suitable for children under 2.Not available OTC in pregnancy and breastfeeding (99p-£5.50 for 14 tablets) Cetirizine - not suitable for children under 2; Not available OTC if breast feeding or pregnant (99p-£5.50 for 14 tablets)

Sodium cromoglicate 2% eye drops - discard 28 days after opening. (£5.00-£6.50 for 10ml)

Beclomethasone - not for patients under the age of 18 Not available OTC in pregnancy and breastfeeding (£4.50-£6.00 for 100 metered dose spray)

Fluticasone - not suitable for patients under the age of 18; Not available OTC in breast feeding, pregnant or planning to become pregnant (£6.60-£8.60 for 50-60 metered dose spray)
