

Y11 Bridging School (14-25 June) by Mr Clements

Last year, we ran a well-received and comprehensive Virtual Bridging School as a consequence of the COVID pandemic. The impact of the initiative has been noticeable as it provided year 11s with pre-learning opportunities and has accelerated the progress of many of the students who are now in Y12.

Our intention this year is to make the school a 'real time" physical experience. Students who indicated that Grey Court Sixth Form is their first choice will be EXPECTED to attend the Bridging School which will comprise 4 double-periods for each of their first THREE subjects choices. This experience will be accompanied by an "enrichment" afternoon where they can partake in an array of extra-curricular and sporting activities. We will also produce induction assemblies and hold an extended study skills tutorial. Students will get to use and inhabit the Sixth Form building and enjoy the cuisine in the Sixth Form cafe.

Below are the details of the subjects you will be studying and the time of these lessons. Please check this carefully and let us know if there are any changes required by Friday 21st May 2021 so we can plan our programme effectively.

The intention of the Bridging School is to help students successfully traverse the (sometimes treacherous) gorge between the KS4 and KS5 curriculum. Our teachers have designed activities that will:

Allow students to sample the subject content and therefore decide whether it interests and motivates them.

Allow students to lay the foundations of their learning so that they will feel confident when they start Sixth Form

Provide students with the opportunity to philosophise, reflect and apply information: key attributes that will help them to secure high grades in the future.

Enable students to hone key study skills based around research, note-taking and presentations.

Develop student skills as an independent and autonomous learner.

Allow students to engage with pre-teaching activities that will form part of the summer homework portfolio they are asked to collate before Sixth Form begins in September. This is especially important as we wish to allay any fears and worries about "lost learning" and a "knowledge gap" that has been reported by the media in recent weeks.

To provide students with a sense of routine, purpose and continuity in uncertain times.

"Bridging" School FAQs

How long will the Bridging School last?

The Bridging School will last <u>TWO</u> weeks from Monday 14th June 2021 to Friday 25th June 2021. It is an expectation that Grey Court students who have indicated that Grey Court is their first choice of sixth form attend the school.

Who qualifies for the Bridging School?

Any student who stated that Grey Court was their first choice Sixth Form in their interview has been invited to attend the school. If a student has indicated that Grey Court is their second choice of Sixth Form but wish to attend please email Mr Clements directly (rclements@greycourt.org.uk). We have prioritized students who intend to come to Grey Court as we are aware that other schools and colleges that the student has a preference for should have set extensive work and transition activities for students to complete.

But what if I am going to college to study a more vocational qualification?

Mr Corrighan and Ms Western have put together an extensive "skills" based set of Bridging activities that will allow those students to develop a portfolio based around topics such as First aid, money management, public speaking and so forth. These will be posted on the Year group google classroom when the assessment window closes and a link will be provided in the eBulletin.

Do I have to wear school uniform? No

How will the Bridging School be organised?

We have created a timetable of lessons from Monday - Friday based around the first three subject choices that were indicated on the student's Sixth Form admission's form. This does not include the subjects: Music, Mandarin, German, Mathematical Studies, Further Mathematics or ICT BTEC as we have been unable to run/staff these subjects for this period. Students will be given the opportunity to interact with their class teacher for two double periods per subject per week. We will also include a sports enrichment session and a study skills session as part of the two week timetable.

What will the lessons' content be like?

Teachers will provide you with a mixture of wide -reading/wide watching stimuli, note taking activities, discussion points, practical work and fun applied thinking style tasks. The aim is to foster a love of the subject, develop study skills and increase student confidence.

What happens if I am unable to attend the transition school?

Please contact Mr Clements (<u>rclements@greycourt.or.uk</u>) if you feel you may be unable to attend the Bridging School stating the reason.

Will the work be assessed?

Classwork assignments will be set which students can upload onto the google classroom. They can also put the work into a portfolio to present to their subject teachers when they start Sixth Form. This will help students to achieve an early "A-level license" (a certificate that allows students to leave school early in afternoons when they have free periods) when they start Sixth Form.

Does the completion of the work mean that I have a place in the Sixth Form?

The completion of the work will help students (and to some extent their teachers) ascertain if students have the aptitude and engagement necessary to thrive on the course at Sixth Form. However, in order to be accepted onto your course students will need to have met the GCSE grades stated in the published entry criteria for each subject.

What happens when the Bridging School ends?

Some work covered in the Bridging School will feature in the summer homework booklet which is sent to all Sixth Forms students applying to Grey Court. Attendance will allow students to complete much of this work in a structured environment with teacher support.

I trust that all students will have a successful assessment period and look forward to welcoming them on Monday, 14 June 2021.

Summer Leavers' Party

As you may be aware, in previous years we have organised several events for Y11, to celebrate and recognise their journey at Grey Court. The last year has been incredibly challenging for everyone, not least for our Y11s. So whilst we can't do everything we would normally do (given restrictions), it is important to us that Y11 still go out with a bang!

Therefore, we have arranged to have a Summer Leavers' Party for Y11 as the last official event that they will all be together as a year group. This will include a mixture of informal celebrations, a BBQ and music, but also a formal element to recognise achievements. This will take place at Grey Court on the 23rd June 2021, 5-7pm. Students should arrive and exit via the Bull Meadow entrance. Dress code is smart casual (we will be on the field). Please note, students should not loiter around the area or on Ham Common after the event, as we need to be respectful to the local residents.

At the beginning of the academic year, all Y11 students were informed that they could not purchase a ticket for the celebration if they had negative conduct points and/or if there were concerns regarding behaviour. However, given how challenging the last year has been for everyone, we have decided to disregard conduct points from term 1, and to only count

conduct points from the 3 weeks prior to Easter (post lockdown) and the weeks post Easter until the Assessments. Your son/daughter has been informed of their conduct points by their tutor this week, so for any students who are in negative conduct points, there is still time to turn things around.

Please note that the school holds the right to withdraw/ prevent any student from going to the Summer Party if behaviour / conduct does not meet our expectations. In addition, any student not adhering to our expectations on the evening will also be asked to leave and parents / carers will be contacted immediately. This relates to any anti-social behaviour including alcohol and drug use.





We offer support on issues young people sometimes face such as stress, substance misuse, relationships, sexual health, school, careers, internet use, etc.


