"Children of Peace" Whole School Muffi Day

We intend to hold a WHOLE school mufti day on Friday, 28 May, in aid of the "Children of Peace" charity. This is in response to student concerns about the recent escalation of violence in Israel/Gaza.

Children of Peace seeks to protect all of the children and their communities in Israel and Palestine – regardless of culture, faith, gender or heritage. They do this by acting as a non-partisan intermediary and by focusing upon building alliances. This is achieved through coexistence projects and programmes in the arts, education, health and sports for Israeli and Palestinian children, aged 4 – 17 years. The charity is endorsed by Joe Biden, The Pope and Boris Johnson amongst others.

We will promote the charity and address the issue in tutor time next week when students will view a short PowerPoint that summarises the work of the charity.

In the past we have worked with organisations such as The Friends of Israel and the Council for Arabic understanding in order to explore the background to conflicts across the Middle East and to debate strategies that will promote conflict resolution.

We will be asking students to make a voluntary contribution of ONE pound on the day which will be collected in tutor time.

Now that we are (hopefully) coming out of lockdown it is timely to remind ourselves of attendance and punctuality expectations. As a school, we expect a minimum of 96% attendance from students. We continue to encourage all students to walk or cycle to school - that way they are in control of their journey time and it cannot be affected by traffic or full buses. If public transport is being used then to get an earlier bus or train will hopefully ensure a punctual arrival to school.

At Grey Court, we have a long tradition with the award where many students successfully complete the Bronze and many more choose to continue their adventure with the Silver and Gold Awards. We have limited places on these awards so priority will be given to those who have done a previous award or if applying for the first time to any award a personal statement as to your suitability will be required.

For next year 2021-22 Deadline for Applications: 10/06/21 We are taking applications for the Bronze Award from our current year 8! (Bronze Award Cost: £33 Enrolment + 2 expeditions £55x2 = £143 approx.)

So what's involved I hear you

ROOOOAR?! For the Bronze Award. students will undertake activities in 3 areas: volunteering, learning a new skill and a physical activity. In many cases this could be a recognition of something (like a club) you already do after or outside of school and shows that you are a committed, focused, determined, resilient and an interesting individual. Finally students will take part in the ever popular practice and assessed 2 day expeditions, provided they have attended and passed their training in: compass bearings, map reading, route cards, tents & rucksacks, cooking and first aid. Are there any rules?!

- You have to be committed—there will be training session that are obligatory for you to attend after school, training and route planning for the expeditions (12 x 2 hours between March and June).
- You have to provide evidence in the form of signed logs, photos and organise an assessors report for each of the 3 activities (September to February)
- You must regularly log onto the DofE website and upload evidence to meet set deadlines—if you miss a deadline you may jeopardise your place on the expedition

Mrs Anjum talks this week about culture, religion and how certain festivals have food as a focal point of these events.















Food, festivals, culture and celebrations

Food is a great consolidator that connects us across cultures and generations. Therefore, it is an important part of any celebrations in all nations of the world regardless of region or religion. Most of the food typically associated with Christmas such as, mince pies and fruit cake arose from Britain. Food is a potent element and can strengthen and unite community bonds and help to maintain a common identity among a group of people. However, the way food is used in celebrations varies from home to home, state to state and from country to country. The celebrations that we have and the way we celebrate them are affected by our cultures and at present there are many different cultures around the world. For us to understand why different foods are used in different celebrations, first we need to understand a little bit about cultures and how it affects the food we eat or use in our diet.

Culture is a learned experience. Culture involves change but some cultures resist change. We are unconscious of our culture. We use certain food because it is so much part of our lives. We saw parents and grandparents eating. This aspect which made us different from others and thus created a whole new innovative society, as food can determine the way people eat and their traditional and religious practices. Cultural influence leads to the differences in the habitual consumption of certain foods and in tradition of preparation, and certain cases can lead to restrictions such as exclusion of meat, milk and certain herbs from the diet.

Recently we heard that Muslims around the world have celebrated Eid ul Fitr, which marks the end of Ramadan, the holy month of fasting. It is celebrated during the first three days of Shawwal, the 10th month of the Islamic calendar (though the Muslim use of a lunar calendar means that it may fall in any season of the year). After morning prayers. They greet each other with "Eid Mubarak", which means "have a blessed Eid". An occasion for special prayers, family visits, gift-giving and charity. Eid al-Fitr is sometimes referred to as the Sugar Feast, a nod to the fact that a large constituent part of the meal one eats at the festival is desserts.

But different countries around the world have different favourites. e.g. Turkey, Baklava and Turkish Delight.

In Iraq & Saudi Arabia, lots of people will bake Kleichas, which are rose-flavoured biscuits that contain a filling of nuts and dates. Yemen, Bint al sahn is the preferred Yemeni sweet (honey cake with Nigella seeds topping). In Asia it's typically sheer khurma, Halwa made by Semolina, Biryani, Haleem, Nihari, Samosa chaat, Dahi Bara, pulao. Practices vary from country to country. In many countries with large Muslim populations, Eid al-Fitr is a national holiday.

Talking about our modern Britain we have special foods connected with certain festivals, for example celebrating Good Friday is hot cross buns, Easter day is roast lamb and nowadays baby chicken is associated with birth and new life. Halloween is toffee apples, Bonfire night is hot soups and jacket potatoes, Shrove Tuesday is Pancake Day and Christmas day is turkey, vegetables, stuffing, bread sauce, cranberry sauce and gravy, mince pie, pudding with brandy. In the modernist world we celebrate Valentine's Day, chocolate day and a couple more!!!

For Easter, the question is why do we eat pancakes on a Shrove Tuesday? The tradition comes from families using up all ingredients in their cupboards or store room so that they can start to mark the beginning of the Christian festival of Lent the next day. Shrove Tuesday happens on different days every year. Though historically, Shrove Tuesday is a traditional feast day before the start of lent on Ash Wednesday, 40 days leading up to Easter was traditionally a time for fasting and sacrifice. Often children/ adults give up eating chocolates.

All sorts of celebrations and the food that grace them have brought people from all over the world closer together, no matter which culture or religion they are from around one table and under one roof, purely to enjoy the love of food.



This is achieved through coexistence projects and programmes in the arts, education, health and sports for Israeli and Palestinian children, aged 4 – 17 years. The charity is endorsed by Joe Biden, The Pope and Boris Johnson amongst others.

We will promote the charity and address the issue in tutor time next week when students will view a short PowerPoint that summarises the work of the charity.

In the past we have worked with organisations such as The Friends of Israel and the Council for Arabic understanding in order to explore the background to conflicts across the Middle East and to debate strategies that will promote conflict resolution.

We will be asking students to make a voluntary contribution of ONE pound on the day which will be collected in tutor time.

Anton's Biography

I've been flying for almost 30 years now and qualified as a pilot on 11 different types but can remember right back to my very first solo flight. I also left school completely uncertain as to what career path I wanted to follow.

Having chosen the degree which I believed would give me the best results whilst having the most fun, I studied Biological Sciences at University in Edinburgh and at the last possible moment, became involved in the University Air Squadron taking my first flying lessons in a little trainer called the Bulldog.

Fast forward to today and I'm currently a long haul pilot with British Airways, a business owner and consultant for the medical community. I also have a role as a British Airways pilot selector.

Along the way, I served 18 years in the RAF, flying on operations around the world and also instructing new fast jet pilots and inter-service racing for the RAF ski team.




