We are delighted to welcome our new Y7s to Grey Court. They have made a fantastic start and seem to have brought the weather with them from primary school!



# Now I know why the caged bird sings! by Mr Clements

When I was a youthful teacher trainee (about half a decade ago) my teacher trainer (a man who bore an uncanny resemblance to Chewbacca from *Star Wars*) in our first inset meeting, asked the class to recall our "most memorable" lesson. Fossicking about in the recesses of my memory I tried to recall one of those "light a flame" moments from millennial TV adverts promoting teaching. However, after 10 minutes of rewinding through 11 years of compulsory education (by my estimate - if one multiplies the 195 allocated teaching days a year by the 6 lessons that make up a school day: a total of 1170 - and then further multiplies that by 11, you will simultaneously reach the limit of my own mathematical abilities and the number 12,870. ) out of the 12,870 lessons I had experienced in my lifetime, how many "light a flame" moments could I recall?

Well...precisely - none to be exact. Is this an indictment of the 1980s comprehensive system or Thatcher's Britain you might ask? Well not, really: I liked school, I attended school, I was relatively good at it. I went on to university. I graduated. I was happy - but "light a flame" moments, they were not so much extinguished as indistinguishable. And so when the hirsute eyebrows of my lecturer arched into a frown - and the tip of his laser pen alighted on my lapel - only two lesson fragments came into my head: my maths teacher Mr Hunt's yearly lesson on polygons - where he drew an empty parrot cage on the board and asked the class rhetorically, "what's that?" Before replying - "A polygon." (I loved the pun, but still struggled to get the answer exactly right!) And a lesson about drowning kittens delivered by my English teacher - Mr Scholar which was inspired by Nobel laureate Seamus Heaney's semi-autobiographical poem, "The Early Purges."

So fearful of undermining the INSET by referencing parrots or catricide, I simply opened my mouth and said...nothing..which - prompted both a disappointed face and a specially differentiated question from the Wookie: "Well, tell me about *any* memorable experience from your school days?"

I ruminate for a light-second and then said, "well...there was the time when we played a school cup final at a non-league stadium, or every week when Mr Bennet would drive us to the American army base to use their gym or when we went to Stratford on a theatre trip and were allowed to spend two hours in McDonalds! Or the field trip along the beach where we spontaneously went swimming...and the teachers joined in. And then when I was in year 7 and went on an activities day water-skiing with the year 9s and they were wearing Sergio Tacchini tracksuit tops. Or at lunch - for a year - when the PE teachers let us play on the table tennis tables kept in the school basement or when - in year 11 - we were allowed to use the trampettes to practice dunk shots in the basketball hall and Gareth Clark jumped so high that he slam dunked and broke both his wrists. Or when they painted the school library white and bought some colourful pillows, a Lord of the Rings poster and a set of fighting fantasy novels and we could sit in there and read them at lunch. Or when I was allowed to leave school at midday for a whole summer to appear as a Victorian urchin extra in a theatre production...OR when...

And so before I become too nostalgic or labour the point - Covid has taught us that when life is shut down or school is merely "functioning" or "open" or pupils are just made "assessment ready" *routine* becomes, well, *routine* and each day is guilty of blurring into the rest of the 2145 that will make up a school experience.

Grey Court is an institution that aspires to put the extra- into extra-curricular - as the perusal of any eBulletin will provide testament to. So as the year begins and we ease back into a familiar..and much loved...routine - read through the eBulletin and encourage your child to create their own kaleidoscopic of *"or when"* moments. From making chutney at allotment club, to pampering their pooch for the *secret life of pets* day, or participating in our Olympic sized sports programme, or performing in our Oscar worthy arts festival or making it all add up in the maths challenge, time may be finite but opportunities are infinite and will serve to light up the routine! ### Parenting Courses with Noël Janis-Norton

Two new parenting courses, one for teens and one for primary-age children, presented by renowned author Noël Janis-Norton of 'Calmer, Easier, Happier Parenting' will be starting in September.



The six-week virtual parenting courses will focus on bringing out the best in children with ADHD and related issues.

Noël will explain the benefits of a positive, firm and consistent approach to help with the 'Big Five' goals that parents of ADHD children often ask for advice about: cooperation, confidence, motivation, self-reliance, and consideration. Her sessions will address the following problems:

Children with an extreme temperament: very sensitive, intense, impulsive, inflexible, and who often show a discrepancy between above-average cognitive ability and immature social or emotional development:

- weak executive function
- rudeness, verbal and/or physical aggression
- preoccupation with screens
- below-average receptive and/or expressive language
- sibling rivalry and jealousy
- routines

In each webinar session Noël will introduce and explain one or more practical and effective strategies and this will be followed by time for Q&A.

Hello Grey Court Sixth Form

Firstly allow me to say a huge thank you for welcoming me so warmly to your community over the past two weeks. I'm really excited for the year ahead and I'm certain we have a year of hard work and success ahead of us.

Prior to joining Grey Court I'd worked for eight years in a school in Rotherhithe where I'd been a Head of House and Head of A-level sciences. My educational background is in mechanical engineering and so, as well as being head of Y12, I'll be teaching physics at Grey Court from Y9 upwards, mostly at A-level.

The upcoming year will be one of the most formative in your life so it's important to hit the ground running. The next few weeks will be your habit-forming weeks so make sure you're consciously forming positive habits or you'll be unconsciously forming negative ones. With that in mind I'll finish with a quote from the author Stephen King "Talent is cheaper than table salt. What separates the talented individual from the successful one is a lot of hard work." ### **Y12 Threshold Assessments**

This week all Y12 students have sat their threshold assessments for literacy, Maths and the science subjects. These will be marked by teachers over the next week and results will be handed back to students the week after. These will be marked as either 'A' - above the required standard, 'S' - at the required standard and 'B' - below the required standard.

# **FAQS**

# Which A-levels involve substantial essay writing skills?

English Literature, History, Geography, Philosophy, Politics, Psychology, Sociology, Economics. You will therefore be required to take the literacy assessment if you have opted for these subjects.

# Which A-levels involve substantial numeracy skills?

If you take Computer Science, mathematics, physics and chemistry you will be required to sit a ONE hour Mathematics paper.

# Why do I have to sit a threshold assessment for each Science subject that I opt for?

If you opt to take Physics, Chemistry or Biology at A-level you will be required to sit a ONE hour paper in this subject. This is because the A-level sciences tend to involve the most significant "jump" in

terms of skills and abilities from GCSE. This means that some students struggle to bridge the gap between A-level and GCSE during their A-level studies. BTEC applied science – with its modular format and higher coursework often provides a more flexible pathway for students to access science degrees and careers.

# What happens if I gain a "below standard" grade?

This is an indicator that you may struggle to cope with the demands of A-level standard assessment. Remember that A-level courses take two years to complete so they are a great deal of investment in time and effort. If you invest two years of time into a project you do not want to limit the options or pathways open to you at the end of it with poor grades as well as work related stress and anxiety.

At this point you may wish to opt for a course that is more suited to your talents and abilities and so has a better chance of **broadening** your options when you leave us. We can provide suitable advice and guidance at this point.

# What happens AFTER assessment week?

If you gain a grade "at or above the standard" for the threshold assessment you will work towards preparing for the first round of A-level style assessments in early October. If you receive a "below standard" grade you will be given the opportunity to change onto a more suitable course if places exist on it. If you opt to continue you will be provided with appropriate subject specific targets in order to build your capacity for the October assessments. Although, it should be noted that these are likely to require a higher level of expertise to pass as they will be marked using "A-level" standards.

# Y13 Assessment Week

We are running an assessment week for Y13 on the week commencing 27 September.

There are a number of reasons for this:

- 1. **UCAS predictions** while we do have the results for the summer assessments we want to give them an opportunity to get a better grade.
- 2. **Providing an accurate picture** of where all students are so that staff are able to support.
- 3. **Getting them back into A Level mindset** as quickly as possible.

These are going to be run within lessons and each subject will set an exam paper that is between an hour and an hour and a half long. Subject teachers will communicate the content of the assessments to students in lessons and an overview will be posted in Google classroom and go home in next week's eBulletin.

## UCAS

This is the time of year when Y13s should be finalising their UCAS forms. We expect all UCAS applications to be submitted to the school before the half term break in October. Once an application is submitted to the school we add a reference and predicted grades and then the school sends it to UCAS, who in turn sends it to the universities. We have an early deadline at Grey Court which we have found advantageous for our students by getting it out of the way before mock exams in December. There is evidence that some universities offer lower grades at the start of the cycle, having offers is a great incentive to students and gives them something concrete to work for.

Students applying to Oxbridge or medicine/dentistry/veterinary courses should submit their UCAS forms by 25 September to meet the earlier deadline for these applications.

We encourage all Y13s to submit a UCAS form to keep their post-18 options open, they will not be committed to take up any places they may be offered and it means they are 'in the system' if they decide down the line that they would like to go onto higher education. We store all UCAS applications and so will be able to provide references if we are asked for them in the future.

Y13s have been informed that all sections of their UCAS form, except for their personal statement, should be complete and they should be in the process of making their course choices and adding them to their form.

All Y13 students should have submitted a good draft of their personal statement to their tutor and they should be amending them according to the feedback they have received. If any student is struggling to fill in their UCAS form they should see Ms McNicol for support.




