As part of our enterprise programme, and with the BBC's *The Apprentice* currently on TV, I wanted to take a look at teenagers that have started their own business and are already working for themselves outside of their school time.

The latest teenage entrepreneur we have a look at is: Ollie Forsyth (19 years old)

Ollie left school at the age of 16 with no qualifications but was determined to start his own business by the age of 20. Ollie began his business "Ollie's Shop" where he would sell products to teenagers.

Ollie was able to get suppliers to provide him with bracelets for free so he could sell them and make enough money to start buying from the suppliers and keep them on board with his business. Ollie's shop turned over £13,000 in its first year and Ollie went on to start up another business, UniBell, where students could buy and sell products at university campuses.

Ollie has stated in the past that people did not take him seriously as a young student but was able to change this after networking and making connections with people.

Well done to our year 8 and 9 students for their engagement this half-term.

Enjoy your half-term break, restock any missing uniform or equipment and we look forward to seeing everyone on the 21 February.



Black and British - Year 7 Alternative Curriculum

As part of our endeavours to diversify our curriculum year 7 students were asked to engage with David Olusoga's text "Black and British: a short essential history in their form times and accelerated reading lessons before Christmas. This important celebration of British history had been purchased for the school by the Grey Court Education fund. Our principle aims were to raise students' awareness about the contribution of black people to Britain's history and culture; and to provide students with the critical tools and language to debate and interpret ideas about culture and identity.

As part of their reading and the discussion based lessons around the text that tutors facilitated, students engaged with diverse black and British figures from our shared history such as: Dido Belle, Septimius Severius, John Blanke, Mary Fillis and Leroy Logan.



They also engaged in debates around institutional racism, the legacy of slavery, social activism and commonwealth ideologies.

In order to try to measure the impact of the project, our school librarian, Mr Johnson, initiated a survey on the reading that 184 students completed.

I have summarised some of the key findings from the survey below:

- 184 students took the survey and 172 gave very positive responses. 93% gave positive feedback on the book and the lessons surrounding it.
- Only 7% of students didn't know who David Olusoga is after reading the book.
- 89% of students now know who Dido Belle is.
- 78% know what diversity means and how important it is to accept it in society.

Mr Johnson has also curated a number of student comments about their experience of engaging with this text.

"I have learnt about black Britons from the past and how they lived as well as how they made a difference in Britain."

"I have been informed about how Black people helped in the World Wars"

"I learned about the tough history of black people."

"I have benefited from reading this book as I have learnt all the challenges that black people who are British faced."

"I benefited from it because if I had never read the book I wouldn't have learnt all about this since usually schools only teach about white, famous people and never Black."

We also garnered opinions about how we could improve the lessons when they are delivered to next year's cohort. Students felt that we should simplify some of the vocabulary as some readers found it difficult to understand." Others felt that we should "encourage other schools to buy it" or that "we should make everyone in the school read the book." Another contributor thought that it would be of benefit if we "compared it to modern times."

In his own review of the book, Mr Johnson felt that Olusaga succeeded in "presenting his powerful subject matter in a clear, sensible and measured manner." I would agree with Mr Johnson's wisdom and hope that students benefited from the experience of reading and discussing the text.

Our intention for next year, is to develop a similar scheme of lessons for women's histories and LGBTQ histories of notable Britons for form time and the accelerated reading provision. Many thanks to the students and their tutors for participating enthusiastically and for Mr Johnson for coordinating the project.

As we bid farewell to our lovely Food and Nutrition technician, Mrs Anjum, she leaves us with some more words of wisdom. She discusses the highly debated topic of GM foods - which our year 10s will investigate after half term. We wish her all the love and luck in her new job. She will be sorely missed!

Genetically Modified Food

Most of the food we eat today was created through traditional breeding methods. Generally, changing plants and animals through traditional breeding can take a long time. Therefore, it is very difficult to make certain changes. After the development of genetic engineering in the 1970's they were able to make similar changes in a more specific way. To modify a food took a short time and less effort.

Genetically modified foods also known as genetically engineered food (GE Foods) or bioengineered food, defined as organisms (ie plants or animals) in which the genetic material (DNA) has been altered in a way that does not occur naturally by mating and/or natural recombination processes.

Most existing genetically modified crops have been developed to improve yield through the introduction of resistance to plant diseases or increased permissiveness of herbicides. GM foods also allow reduction in food prices through improved yield, reliability of product & innovation such as drug production, food quality, greater food security, sustainability and medical benefits to the world's increasing population.

In the coming years, genetic modification could be aimed at altering the nutrients content of food, decreasing its allergenic potential or enhancing the efficiency of food production systems. Here are some examples of genetically modified food; corn, soybean, cotton, potatoes, papaya, squash, canola, alfalfa. Although the current research suggests that GMO foods are safe to consume, some people and health experts are concerned about their potential health effects. There are some risks attached to genetically modified food such as allergic reactions, antibiotic resistance, immune suppression and loss of nutrition but due to lack of long term study and practice more research is needed to explore this fast growing technique.

Though, GM food is not commercially grown in UK, a variety of products can be imported e.g oil seed rape, soya bean, cotton seed oil, maize, sugar beet. What are your thoughts on this highly debated issue?

Year 12 History Trip: Hampton Court

On Thursday 3 February, our year 12 history students went on a trip to Hampton Court to get a deeper understanding of the topic *Hentry VIII and the Reformation*. The students got to explore the palace and grounds before attending a workshop with a reformation expert. It was a great opportunity for the students to get a feel of what life would have been in Henry VIIIs court, and was enjoyed by all.





You can either navigate to our Sports Calendar via the main menu, and then select the day you are interested in and then click the details link. This shows the venue and, if we're playing away, will have a link to the location map of our opponent's school. You can also see the team selected for the fixture wherever you see the blue image. Normally we announce team selections at least 72 hours before the fixture.

From the Sports' Calendar you can also click directly through to a team's fixtures & results listing by clicking the Team's Name. e.g. click on the "Girls-U16A".

If you are following a particular team or teams you can also select **Sports & Teams Fixtures & Results** from the main menu. Then select a particular sport and your team to see **past results and upcoming fixtures**.

From any teams Fixture list you can "spy" on the opponents recent results by clicking on the spyglass **button**, or see the playing record by clicking on this **button**, or find their location by clicking on the map point **button**.

From any team's Fixtures & Results listings you can also download the entire fixture list to your personal calendar on your PC or mobile device (such as an iPhone or iPad). Any changes we make to our fixtures will be synchronised with your personal calendar whenever you connect your PC or mobile device to the Internet.

If you need to quickly find an away venue for one of our opponents you can either choose the map link directly from a fixture, available via the "details" button as described above, or you can select "Opponent Maps & Links" from the main menu.

If you are visiting our sports website on your mobile phone you will notice it loads up as a Mobile Web App. Full instructions on how to get the most out of the Web App can be found online by clicking **here**. The mobile Web App will allow you to access Fixture and Team Sheet information on the go!
