

CONGRATULATIONS to the A Level Drama and Theatre Studies group who have completed their Devising work with a beautiful play. Nowhere else in the curriculum are students asked to work creatively together and using theory, create an artefact, a product, a performance together. How would you feel if you were asked to create a painting with three other people? How could you negotiate, steer, select colour, space, shape and produce a work for an audience? It is an amazing achievement. The students worked tirelessly on their structure and logistics of who was on which chair in which scene and the final outcome was a testament to their resilience and dedication.

In just nineteen minutes, the student actors took on the journeys of four women and their particular relationship with childbirth and parenting. Each student created a character with a story which was played in front of us employing a range of dialogue, narration, action and movement. With occasional choreographic ideas borrowed from Frantic Assembly, the group assured the play had a soft and poetic style within the episodic form. The students were keen that this remain personal stories of their characters and not a socio-political debate about, to select the most topical 'issue', abortion. The group was keen to remind us that 'the personal IS political' and what happens to an individual remains of social and political importance.



The students performed with discipline and focus and the final exam show was, without doubt, the strongest performance. A big "well done" to the group, and thanks to Ms Howell and Mr Taktak for their assistance and support.



They provide adaptive snowsports, parkour, fencing, climbing and more!

Heatham House Youth Centre in central Twickenham is the flagship centre for the borough of Richmond and works with thousands of young people(9-19 years old) every year. Booking is now open for so many fantastic activities from football to Tae Kwon Do, dance, basketball, cooking, music and much more.

The Lighthouse Project is a closed group for young people 11 to 24 years with autistic spectrum condition (ASC) or attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD). The sessions take place at Heatham House for the age groups above.

Knots Arts work in three London Boroughs, Richmond-upon-Thames, Sutton and Camden. And run a range of sessions including drama, activity groups and youth clubs for children and young people aged 4 – 25.

Literary Festival proves to be a Tour de Force



It was a case of the Moore the merrier on Thursday night as the English society welcomed esteemed travel writer, Tim Moore, into our esteemed halls. An eclectic audience of eighty staff, students and parents as well as some congruous middle-aged men in lycra, were regaled by Mr Moore's readings from his new book "Vuelta Skelter." This tome recounts his cycling adventures as he follows in the treadmarks of political prisoner and Vuelta winner, Julian Berrendero, as he retraces his 1941 Vuelta route across Spain in a time of Covid.

The aim of the English society is to set aside a space for intellectual reflection and debate, to celebrate the written and spoken word and to provide a platform for the talents of Grey Court writers and artists. The evening was inspired by the arrival of a number of Ukrainian refugees on our shores. This meant that we bookended the festival with readings from British-Somali poet Warsan Shire and Anglo-American icon, W H Auden. Their respective poems "Conversations about Home (at a deportation centre)" and "Refugee Blues" were read by talented Year 10 wordsmiths Lamar Helena Ferreira Dias and Lamar Mansour and secret slam-poets, Euan Janes (Year 12) and Ms Comrie.

Both poems highlight the capacity the UK has to welcome refugees to our shores as a place of opportunity and sanctuary, but also to allow individuals the freedom for artistic comment and dissent. The evening culminated in a rendition of the Clash's iconic song, "London Calling" which has been adopted as a rallying cry in the Ukraine. Performed by our talented Year 11, 4-piece, house band, Pictures of Trickery, the piece literary and metaphorically brought the curtain down, in time for the enraptured audience to stumble outside blinking into a lovely midsummer's evening.

The evening highlighted my own management mantra of: throw an idea up in the air, look slightly befuddled, and watch on in admiration as the talented and able run with it. So many thanks to the following people for making the Grey-on-Wye-festival happen:

It has been a brilliant month for Julia who has competed for the Grey Court athletics team in both the 800m, 1500m and the long jump. She has been a key figure in the Junior Girls athletics team, leading by example at Borough Sports and ESAA fixtures. At sports day, Julia broke the Year 7 girls school record in the 1500m by a huge twelve seconds, front running a time of 5 minutes 41 seconds. She ran the 800m and 1500m in each of the rounds at English Schools, performing well at both events. So far this season Julia has run a PB of 2 minutes 37 seconds over the 800m and jumped 4 meters 45 in the long jump.

The latter of these shattered the Borough sports record, earning Julia a 1st place finish as Borough Champion. Julia was a fundamental part of the winning junior girls' team that dominated the preliminary round of the English Schools, eventually going on to compete at regionals. Julia always arrives to middle distance training and athletics club sessions prepared and hungry to give her best. It is this level of application that has led to her having so much success on both the track and field this term

At Borough sports, the boys dominated the event, winning all year groups from Years 7 - 11. This was helped by stand out performances from a number of athletes over both the track and field. In Year 8, Benn Povey took the victory in the 200m running 26.52 seconds. He then followed this up with a PB jump of 5 metres 30 to take the long jump crown. The Year 9 boys had numerous first place finishes over both the track and field. Some of the stand out victories included Max Seddon running 11.74 in the 100m, Josh Harwood-White winning the 800m in 2.07 and Shakur Roberts winning the long jump with 5 metres 45. In Year 10 and 11, the boys took the crown over Hampton by 6 points. There were stand out victories coming from Charlie Bretherton in the 200m in 24.09 seconds, Charlie Richardson in the 800m in 2.05 and Theo Povey in the high jump in 1.74 metres.




Borough Champions

There were a number of strong individual performances over the course of the day. 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
