The End of Google Guardian Summaries and SIMS Parent

In our continued efforts to improve parental access to their children's school data, we have decided to end the use of Google Guardian summaries and SIMS Parent from 19/07/22. From September 2022, we will use **Edulink**, which provides access to information such as homework, achievement, attendance all in one place.

Unfortunately, we had many issues with both SIMS Parent and Google Guardian summaries which led us to researching the market in order to provide parents with a reliable system where they can access the information in one place, thus no need for two separate systems. **Edulink** provides this solution. Students will also be given access to their **Edulink** account where they will be able to view timetables, achievement and behaviour points, and homework, which will sync directly from Google Classroom. Extreme Rivers Revelation finds Dorey all at sea!



I, and the Y7 team, wish all students and parents a restful summer - and we look forward to seeing what you all the students will go on to achieve in the future.


Year 9 Water Safety Course at Albany Outdoors, Kingston

A Level Enrolment

Thursday 25 August: threshold assessments

A level examinations are very exam-focused and you are judged - for the most part - on your ability to perform under pressure for periods of 2-3 hours in a very controlled environment. We have, therefore, opted to timetable a series of threshold assessments in the week beginning 12 September 2022. These will be in Literacy, Mathematics, Biology, Chemistry and Physics.

Therefore, if you are studying English Literature, History, Geography, Philosophy, Politics, Psychology, Sociology, Economics. you will be required to take a literacy assessment.

If students take mathematics, physics and chemistry, you will be required to sit a **ONE** hour Mathematics paper.

If you opt to take Physics, Chemistry or Biology at A-level you will be required to sit a **ONE** hour paper in this subject.

If you gain a "below standard grade" this is an indicator that you may struggle to cope with the demands of A-level standard assessment. At this point we would advise you to opt for a course that is more suited to your talents and abilities and so has a better chance of **broadening** your options when you leave us. We will provide suitable advice and guidance at this point.

After you have enrolled in the summer you will be sent a confirmation email that will have all the relevant revision materials attached to it in order to adequately prepare for these tests

Year 13 Clearing and Clearing Plus

If you have not met the requirements for your firm or insurance choice of university, or you have changed your mind about the course you want to study you can have a look for courses through Clearing. Click <u>Here</u> to find out more about Clearing and how to use it.

Clearing Plus

UCAS have created a new addition to Clearing to help you. With thousands of different courses available it can be hard to find the perfect option. To speed things up, UCAS have taken what they know about you, and what they know about the types of students unis are looking for, to suggest some courses you might like. If you express an interest in a course, the university or college can contact you. Don't worry, you can still browse courses in Clearing using our search tool.

Who can use it?

Clearing Plus isn't available for everyone. If you're unsuccessful with your application or are applying for the first time for a place in Clearing, you'll be able to 'view your matches'.

How does the matching work?

First, they look at your original choices you applied for, combined with your qualifications and grades. Universities and colleges have already told us what courses they'd like to make available in Clearing Plus (no, not all courses are included in your matches), and the entry requirements for them. Then, they analyse what students in Clearing went on to study in previous years.

The UCAS team then matches your profile to each course.

How do I see my matches?

If you're eligible – you're unsuccessful or applying for the first time – you will see a button in <u>Track</u>, 'See matches'. Once you hit that you'll be able to see a full list of your matches.

If you express an interest in a course, that university or college can contact you. But remember, courses in Clearing fill up quickly, and you may not always receive a call.

We'd therefore recommend you also look for courses in Clearing using our search tool.


