


Well done to Y7 for another good week at Grey Court.


THE PLASTIC CHALLENGE






Year

Review on the UCAS Media Trip by Max O'Connell



Thank you again to Miss Howell, Mr Allchurch and Mr Page for making the trip so entertaining and for giving so much of their own time to give us such a golden opportunity.







































October is ADHD Awareness Month, a chance for us all to focus on a very frequently misunderstood condition that affects an estimated 2.6 million people in the UK. There are many myths attached to ADHD: it's an excuse for laziness, it's down to bad parenting and lack of discipline, it's bad diet are just a few of them. The truth is, it really is down to the chemical dynamics of the brain - something very definitely not under voluntary control.

This month especially, let's do our best to make those who are misinformed, more informed. Whether it's family members who just can't get their heads around it/cannot accept that it's a 'thing', school teachers who just see a disruptive, uncooperative pupil or just general lack of knowledge about the condition within the community, it's crucial that the below facts are understood:

- ADHD is real it's a common neurological medical condition
- ADHD is a complex condition with symptoms that can be pervasive, persistent and continue throughout life
- ADHD can co-exist with other mental health conditions (autism, anxiety, sleep disorders to name a few)
- ADHD should not be side-lined or ignored if untreated and unsupported, it can lead to larger problems
- ADHD is nobody's fault it's a brain-based condition and it's been proven to be genetic
- ADHD treatment is multi-faceted along with parental support, medication, psychotherapy, CBT as well as help and understanding in schools are all options available

If you're a parent/carer of a child with ADHD, consider accessing our resources to equip yourself with the strategies and tools to help empower your child or teenager for success at school and at home. 



This is not the student deadline as the school needs several days to process the application. The next step is to focus on preparing for the pre-interview assessments (if their application required one). Students must confirm if they will need to submit any work as part of their application and make sure they have prepared the required pieces well in advance.




