
A big thank you to all students who submitted plastic to me over the last 30 school days. In total, I have collected nearly 700 plastic bottles, and other plastic containers. Only 4% of the students and staff took part, suggesting that in reality nearly 15000 pieces of single use plastic were used in that time. According to a report from the Guardian, we use nearly 38.5 million plastic bottles every day in the UK, putting my estimate of school usage at roughly 24000 plastic bottles in that time. Please watch this video on YouTube (not affiliated with Grey Court) that I have shown in assembly this week about the damage plastics is doing to our oceans.

Our continued use of single use plastic is contributing to various global disasters, including climate change, ocean habitat destruction, and food chain contamination. Roughly 8 million tonnes of plastic end up in the oceans every year, with nearly 100 million animals dying every year due to plastic pollution. Microplastics make up most of the plastics we are polluting the planet with, and these have been now found in the food we buy in supermarkets. We do not know the long-term health effects of this, but they are likely not to be good.

This is why I am launching two school initiatives:

- · on **Monday 12 December 2022**, I'd like students to bring in reusable water bottles
- · by **6 January 2023**, students need to submit designs to build a piece of art using the plastic we've collected

The aim here is to promote the use of reusable plastic items, and reduce our reliance on single use plastics. Not only are they damaging the world around us, but they rely on the use of crude oil - a fossil fuel predicted to run out by 2060 if we keep using it in such large quantities. Prices of commodities using fossil fuels have already begun to increase, and will only become more expensive as this resource runs out. Making a shift to other materials, or reusable items, means that we do not need to be buy/dispose of items regularly and can save the money in our purses/wallets.



To those that drink water from plastic bottles regularly, I make a plea to you to switch to tap water. In the UK, we have some of the safest drinking water in the world, and we have stricter rules on what can go in tap water than bottled water. I ask those that can afford it, to switch from buying plastic bottles to buying drinks in cans and cartons - if we all vote with our purchasing habits, companies will be more likely to shift production and costs will lower. I understand in this cost-of-living crisis that the type of containers we use may not seem like a big deal, but we won't have a planet that is liveable in our children's lifetimes if we don't start shifting our habits to sustainable purchases. We also need to be able to support those of us that cannot afford to make the switch at this time.

In collaboration with the Art department, I'd like to launch a competition to do something productive, memorable, and meaningful with the plastic we've collected. I will do another drive later this year to collect more plastic if needed, but Ms Maybey and I look forward to seeing the designs you come up with.

Thank you again to all involved, but a big thank you to Jenna (Year 8) who provided me with over 100 plastic bottles she (with help) collected from students leaving their plastic behind at lunch.

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
Scholar of the Month Mia Rose Helledie

Achievement Points







Year 13

Assessment Weeks commencing 28 November

During the two assessment weeks students will be on exam leave. Creative Media and Music Tech students are required to attend all lessons that do not clash with exams. Should they want to attend lessons then subject teachers will provide students with revision materials or they can revise from home. Please click here for the revision booklet, which also includes the exam timetable. This has also been made available on the google classroom for students.

These will take place in the exam hall with external invigilators. While we are aware that this may cause stress and anxiety for students, it is important that they experience formal exam conditions as this allows them to familiarise themselves with the set up and also provides teachers with data about how they perform in a formal exam scenario.

UCAS Update

a note of predicted grades

It is important to note that the grades that are predicted for UCAS are aspirational as they have been taken from the best grades that were achieved in the mock exams and that we add an additional grade per subject in order to allow for aspirational predictions and university offers that inspire and motivate. For example, if you got CCC last year then we would predict BBB; BDD would turn into ACC or BBC.

However, while our UCAS predictions are aspirational, they are not necessarily a prediction of what classroom teachers feel students will achieve and do not form part of the body of data that we take into consideration when assessing how students are doing. Therefore the predictions that came home in reports are the most accurate indicator of what teachers feel are the most likely grades to be achieved at the end of the year. These are based on mock examinations, classwork, coursework and practical work (when relevant).




This week in Cross Country lessons. we have been focusing on the lifelong benefits of physical activity. Year 9 girls had some excellent ideas that they DM'd the PE department.
