UCAS What Comes Next?

Once you have heard from all five courses you applied to you should choose a firm choice and an insurance choice of course. Sounds scary but the earliest deadline for responding is the 8th June so there is plenty of time for making decisions. Many students will have received invites to Offer Holder Days. This is the best way of helping students choose the best course and university for them. You should look at not just the university but the city or town where it is located. Consider factors such as whether you like the set up of a campus university or a university spread across a city. Think about where you might live in the second year when you will not be living in university accommodation. You might want to think about whether there will be opportunities for part time work to help supplement your living expenses. Check out transport to and from university - how long will it take you to get there and arrive in time for your 9.00am lecture? How long will it take to get back to your family home and how much will it cost? What social activities does the student union offer?

Below is a brief presentation and a short video link to a UCAS guide on how to accept offers.

How to Accept your University Offers

When you are making your choices you should base your decision for your firm choice of the university you most want to go to. When choosing an insurance choice it should be a university that has made you a lower offer (but you are still happy to attend). This will mean that if you miss your grades for your firm choice you will still be given a place at your insurance university and won't have to go through the Clearing process in August.

UCAS EXTRA

Extra opened on February 23rd and it allows you to add another course choice if you have received decisions from all five, and weren't accepted, or if you declined the offers you received.

If you did not use all your choices in your initial application, you don't need to use Extra, you can just sign in to your application and add another choice, as long as it's before 30 June, and you've not accepted or declined any offers. Please come and talk to Mr Taylor or Ms McNicol before turning down any offers you have been made and using UCAS Extra. It may be that contacting a university and asking to change your course will be a better way of making a change than using Extra.







Just before half term, Year 12 and 13 Music Technology students visited The University of Arts London, College of Communication at Elephant and Castle to tour their state of the art and industry standard recording studios, post production suites and teaching facilities. The students were impressed by the size of the spaces, the attention to detail in acoutsic treatment and the quality of the technology. The faculty's technician and professional studio engineer talked them through the design of the spaces, as well as the technical specifications of each room and welcomed some very sensible questions from our students. The students were then treated to talks about the University's two music technology related courses in a space surrounded by approximately 24 speakers (8 of which were above their heads). The students were given some very good advice about choosing the right courses at University (and whether University is right for them at all) as well as considering music and sound from an artist's point of view. Even the students who want to pursue other subjects at University all gave some extremely positive feedback about the afternoon. Myself and Miss Maybey now also want to go back to University ourselves!

Unfortunately our cup run came to an end today against a very strong @greycourtschool from Richmond. We battled hard and defended well but they were just too good at the end of the day.









SOM: THOMAS




