





The online programme will take place via Zoom on evenings and weekends, and will include:





In explaining the attraction of football over real life, Nick Hornby, in his seminal book "Fever Pitch" observed that "it is just that real life is paler, duller, and contains less potential for unexpected delirium." I will also clearly remember the sense of delirium I felt on a personal level watching Ana Ortega and Zineb Ait Ziane *gegenpress* the opposition





Although, it is a great pity that some of our local neighbouring schools, especially the girls' ones, who have many potential footballers to choose from, have been unable to organise teams for us to play. I have heard that Charterhouse have a girls' sixth form team so the next objective is to organise a game against them! I am already looking forward to the post match tea!



They should have met with their mentors to review their question and initial research.

Oxbridge and EPQ in Year 12

A few students in the new year 12 cohort have been asking me about Oxbridge applications and taking on an EPQ. Whilst I admire their enthusiasm, they need to use the first term to settle into their new courses and reflect on how well they are making the transition between GCSE and A level. If students are interested in Oxbridge, the process will start in February. EPQ for year 12 will begin in the summer after the year 12 exam.

EPQ

This week was the deadline to submit Oxbridge Applications to the school. This is so all the necessary administrative checks can be made and forms can be ready to go with no errors before the full UCAS deadline. The UCAS deadline is for the school and not for the students. The next step is preparing for any pre-interview exams and then the interviews themselves. Some students have already taken up opportunities for support at King's Wimbledon. On the 30th and 31st October, all students will have a full mock interview with an experienced outside provider whom we have used for the last 6 years to support our applicants. There will be a cost attached, partially covered by the school. More details about these interviews will follow shortly.






