Year 11 Trip to Berlin

The last week of term saw a party of 50 inquisitive (and fidgety) Grey Court Year 11 students and 5 intrepid teachers visit the now historic juncture of repression, violence and totalitarianism and freedom, anarchy and self-expression that is Germany's Berlin. It was the fifth time I have visited this wonderful city and my third accompanying Grey Court student parties. To describe my emotional state as excited at the prospect of keeping 50 students and Mr Johnson out of trouble in Europe's party central - especially as the travel company had booked us into a "hipster" hostel in the centre of town with an inhouse DJ - would be an understatement. However, having prepared for the opus by buying a "Berliner" from the German cafe for seven straight days and purchasing Len Deighton's cold war spy novel, "Funeral in Berlin" I met the party at gloomy and overcast Heathrow airport at 0700 hours.

The first barrier in the way to Euro harmony proved to be the checking in process at Heathrow which is now fully automated, alongside the fact that Ms Hawkins had allocated me a party of 10 hyper-active boys with floppy fringes to look after. Jeremy McCarthy may be deemed as a great school exam hope but his ability to single-handedly crash Heathrow's baggage system by printing off his baggage ticket but then forgetting to attach it to his suitcase will surely go down as a classic of cold war inbetweeners style tomfoolery!

Once on a British Airways plane full of wide eyed passengers who seemed slightly perturbed by the arrival of 50 teenagers, I settled down to read Mr Deighton, but was book shamed by Sophia Montenegro, who opened her copy of Tolstoy's Anna Karenina which she had packed for some light reading! I, therefore, opted for a light snooze until we arrived in Berlin in time for an afternoon walking tour which took in the museum district, Brandenburg gate and the Holocaust memorial which we gathered around in the fading Autumn light.

The memorial - which consists of an undulating field of 2711 concrete stelae cast long shadows in the gathering dusk. The memorial was one of several visited during our time in Berlin: the Sachsenhausen camp, Jewish museum, the Wall on Bernauer Strasse and the Stasi prison which allowed the students space and time to reflect on the impact violence, invasion and division has on communities. Throughout my time on the trip I was very impressed by the respectful and inquisitive nature of our students who absorbed a great deal of distressing and at times horrific information about human enmity. This was delivered by a series of expert Berlin residents from ex-Stasi prisoners, to middle aged Berliners who could remember a childhood under the shadows of the wall and even an emigree Israel-Arab poet. It was with this wordsmith that we played a snakes and ladders style board game in the Jewish museum which highlighted the barriers placed in the way of refugees facing persecution in the 1930s.





Indeed, a feature of the trip was that silence was definitely rationed! With DJ's playing in our "Generator" hostel late into the night and the cleaners preparing for the new day with 7am blasts of German techno - silence was certainly at a premium! Chief of the chatterers proved to be dynamic duo Loveday Lea and Coretta Townsend who emitted 20 words for everyone of the 25,000 steps we walked a day! Luckily, they were nothing but cheery! A shout out should also go to Xavier Mtandabari who acted as the party's unofficial tour guide and historical expert as he appeared to have read multiple histories of Berlin in preparation for the visit.

And when the students retired to bed, Ms Moore would regale us with salacious stories of her time as a languages student in Munich. Hopefully, the trip highlighted to the students the importance of protecting freedom and human rights and how reconciliation can occur - over time - amidst rubble, invasion and terrible violence. I trust it has also fired the imaginations of our students to travel and live in Europe when they are older!

From a personal point of view - this proved to be the most enjoyable Berlin trip I have attended. This was on account of Ms Hawkin's perfect organisation and our students' overall behaviour and good humour and the revelation that Ms Collins is an Olympic standard 10-pin bowling champion! A huge thank you to Ms Rahmani who worked tirelessly in the Grey Court intelligence centre to organise the passports, visas, coaches, bookings and medical risk assessments for our party. And well done to my group of boys - Harry, James, Patrick, Leo, Leo, Stan, Roger, Charlie, Harrison and Jeremy - who managed to arrive on time for all of our meetings, follow instructions and provided excellent company on the trip in spite of their collective need to ruffle one another's hair for the entirety of the four days away.

Just before half term, we began to celebrate World food day. An annual international celebration, to commemorate the founding of the United Nations Food and Agriculture Society. Each year has a new focus, on how to live more sustainably and to raise awareness, to make changes so we can live in a world where food, water etc is readily available for all.

The focus this year, water preservation. Whilst this is something that we cover within our curriculum across a number of subjects within school, we are still trying to raise awareness about water waste and how by 2040 a number of countries will be in areas of severe water stress. 

Noah Hall at The Royal Albert Hal







The volunteer perspective: Duke of Edinburgh Silver

On Friday 13 October, I jumped in my car after school and drove towards Brighton for my first ever DofE expedition. I didn't do DofE at school, focusing instead on Arts Award and music grade exams, so I was really excited to see what happened. I camp with groups in Girlguiding, but this was due to be a different experience altogether.

Unfortunately, when I arrived at the campsite, it was raining heavily, so I had to pitch my tent in the rain! Fortunately, it was a pop up tent so the entire process took less than ten minutes. I looked around and saw lots of familiar faces in Year 10. but equally a lot of students I didn't know. Once I was set up, I watched the students cooking their own meals on trangias (portable cooking equipment designed for camping), washing them up and enjoying the warm food. I was particularly impressed by Philine and Jess' group, who had extremely hearty and delicious looking bowls of broth with tofu and a variety of other ingredients! Once the students had eaten and settled into their tents, it was time for us to relax and eat our own dinner, pre-prepared by Mr Nair, so it only required heating. I was so grateful for the warm meal and all of the food was delicious.

The next morning, I started hearing students walking around at 7am - they made breakfast (hot food and/or drink obligatory!!), packed up and left for that day's expedition. I realised I had made a mistake pitching my tent by not having the ropes taut enough, which allowed condensation to come in and soak my sleeping bag. I made a mental note not to do the same again! The sun came out and we sat and relaxed while eating our own breakfast, letting our tents dry in the warm sun, before packing everything up and heading to the checkpoints and the next campsite.

On arrival at the next campsite, an eco site with sawdust toilets and a cold water tank rather than taps, I pitched my tent again (properly this time - much easier in daylight, I must admit!) and waited for the students to arrive. The first group back were delighted to arrive first, and made sure to tell all the other groups how long they had been there when they arrived. There's nothing like a bit of healthy competition!

The students all arrived and pitched their tents before cooking and going to sleep again - they were clearly exhausted by the day's walk! We sat at our campfire and cooked burgers and sausages for our dinner, before heading to bed ourselves.

In the morning, I experienced something I had never experienced before - my tent was frozen shut! I had to defrost the zip with my hands to be able to escape. I was glad the students were sharing tents, which meant that none of them had this issue due to the extra body heat.

The students packed up and left as early as they could, but as the drinking water was too cold to use, I met them during the walk to deliver fresh drinking water. I then returned to the campsite, checked everything was packed away and drove to Lewes station to meet them. I was shocked at how quickly some of the students arrived! They had their trangias collected and their phones were returned before they boarded the train - most likely grateful to be back in a warm environment! I know I was longing for a hot shower and my bed by this point.

This weekend took me out of my comfort zone but I have been well and truly bitten by the DofE bug! I look forward to many more expeditions and also to training as an assessor to be able to help out when needed. A huge thank you to Ms Mannion, Mr Allchurch, Mr Nair and Ms Casey (and her dog!) for their help and support throughout the weekend, and for welcoming me into their team. I look forward to the next one!

As they are a broad university offering a range of courses in areas such as media, music and sound and performance and design for theatre and screen, students interested in future education and career opportunities in the creative arts in general are also welcome to attend. The talk will take place in Sixth Form Art at 13.00 with Ms Corrighan.

Oxbridge Update

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Year 13 Social Science: Behind Bars Conference

On Monday 30 October, Year 13 Social Science (Psychology, Sociology and Health and Social Care) students got the opportunity to attend the Behind Bars Conference which gave them a chance to hear from speakers who worked for and have been through the criminal justice system. The conference started by presenting students with questions to discuss, 'What should be allowed in prisons?' and 'Should prisons be based on retribution, rehabilitation or punishment?'

'Really great event, I really enjoyed listening to all the speakers, especially gaining an insight into what is is like being in mental health institutions' -Oliwia

'It was great hearing from a forensic psychologist and learning about the different types of psychologists and their roles as I am really interested in pursuing this as a career choice' -Yana Students heard from the first speaker, a psychologist who was also an ex-police officer. Her main role now is undertaking risk assessments to see if prisoners are allowed to be released or to change to a lower security prison. The second speaker was an individual who has autism and had previously suffered severely from mental health issues - he had spent time in mental health units. He explained how poetry helped him reconnect with his family and help him understand his emotions. He shared his own poetry with us. The third speaker had collectively

spent 19 years in prison, he gave an insight into his childhood (a large part was spent in youth offending units) and the impact that has had on him.

Before breaking for lunch, students were given details of a case and were asked to pretend to be a part of the jury and give their verdict of guilty or not guilty. The students were surprised to discover that the case was a real-life case of one of the speakers. This speaker spent 13 years in prison and is now on a life parole sentence. Students were shocked as this speaker had committed the most violent crime. However, he was the most well-spoken, dressed in a suit and came across in a very professional manner. It made them question their own stereotypes of 'who is a criminal?'

'I loved the suspense of the real life case and the surprise that it was one of the speakers. I was really shocked' -Kanye



In the afternoon, the students had the opportunity to ask all the speakers questions. Our students demonstrated great maturity and asked loads of fantastic questions to further their understanding of these individuals' lives and experiences of the criminal justice system. Below are some of the questions our year 13 students asked.

'What was your most difficult time of your sentence?'

'How and when did you change your life?'

'Do you still feel anger about your sentence?'

'Do you think the prison system failed you for not recognising your autism?'

'How has working with criminals impacted your own mental health?' 'Did you ever meet someone in prison who were a positive role model?'

In order for Violence Against Women and Girls (VAWG) & the social norms that support it to be tackled within our communities a Whole Community Approach is needed that includes engaging, educating and empowering the Community to become active bystanders. Action Breaks Silence recognizes the pressure boys/men are under to conform to gender norms associated with masculinity and the impact this has on their mental health and wellbeing. The Undefining Masculinity Workshop is for ALL Community members.

Violence and Abuse in the UK:

- One in three women experience abuse in their lifetime
- 61% of 18-24-year-olds feel UK society expects a man to "Man up" when faced with a challenge

- Two women are murdered each week in the UK by their husband or partner; ex-husband or ex-partner


About Action Breaks Silence:

A "Whole Schools Approach" (developed by AVA) is used to engage, educate and empower "all members of the school's community, including school governors, senior management, staff, students and parents" to end VAWG in schools and the surrounding communities.

The Action Breaks Silence Community Intervention which tackles sexual harassment and sexual violence also includes strategies to address gender equality and unhealthy masculinity that underpin this behaviour. The design and delivery of the intervention is guided by the Social Norms and Active Bystander Theories.

Action Breaks Silence is a registered charity in the UK. Action Breaks Silence is also separately a fully recognized charity in South Africa and India. All funds raised from this workshop will enable us to continue to deliver our community interventions, free of charge, at disadvantaged Primary Schools in London. Since 2013, Action Breaks Silence has engaged, educated and empowered over 100,000 beneficiaries.
