





#### **Friends of Ham Lands**

#### Sixth formers get stuck in

Supported by Let's Go Outside and Learn, Friends of Ham Lands and Grey Court staff, a group of Grey Court sixth formers have been working hard to support the precious biodiversity of the Ham Lands local nature reserve. Most Wednesday afternoons in term time, they help to conserve the unique grassland and woodland area they have adopted.

Some of these inspiring young people share their stories here.

The area is known for its rich history and beauty, making Ham Lands not only a unique place, but somewhere to explore and discover. Some of the species have only been recorded on Ham Lands, nowhere else in the whole of London!

On our first session this term, we explored. There were such amazing apple trees; our group tried some of them; we tried three types of apples. They were very tasty and juicy. We also learnt about lichen on the trees. By the colour and the shape, you can discover how good the air in the area is; it is amazing how much nature can tell us. There are areas on Ham Lands where the lichen shows the air quality is amazing, and others where it isn't so good.'



Giant dock is taking over in some areas, and needs cutting back.

'Nature, peace, and fresh air. These words are the most exact definition of Ham Lands for me.' 'The feeling of unification with nature helps to deal with mental health concerns such as anxiety and depression which are very important issues for us. When our group signed up for volunteering, we did not know how beautiful our local area is, and how much biodiversity there is to witness.

As a student I can absolutely say volunteering with Friends of Ham Lands is not only enriching and satisfying for the volunteers and the local community, but also helps to increase biodiversity which is being constantly threatened by climate change. We really look forward to continuing our work and hope that the community will enjoy the area we have worked hard on.'

We are looking to reach out to parents of your pupils as we search for German / English speaking children for our two lead roles.

We will also be casting support children's roles in the near future but right now we are focusing on our two main children Karl and Rosa.

#### The Children: Leads - Austria / Northern Ireland.

#### KARL MÜLLER - 9 to 13 years old, (or look so) - Karl is bi-lingual - German and English.

Karl is the heart and soul of our story. Karl goes through an immense range of experiences, emotionally and physically.

He is physically fit, smart, plays football, is a tease to his sister at home, and his character is proudly Jewish. He is pre bar mitzvah.

After Kristallnacht, Karl's parents reluctantly put their beautiful children on the trains out of Vienna. Karl is given the role, by his devastated Papa, to step up and be an adult before his time, and to protect his little sister Rosa, on their journey to the United Kingdom. The hope is that their parents, uncle Rudi and Oma will follow.

Karl is a complex yet sympathetic character. We so understand his pain and we root for him. We want him to in to the new friendships he is offered, but he longs to get home to his family.

Karl steps up. He does not back down the physical dangers of his journey, but his greatest battle will be to believe again - in love and in hope.

#### ROSA MÜLLER - 5 to 8 years old, (or look so) - Rosa is bi-lingual - German and English.

A bright eyes charmer, when we meet Rosa she is the princess of the whole family, and Uncle Rudi and her family are happy to indulge.

She is the apple of her Papa's eye, she can get whatever she wants - if Papa, a cobbler with a small show shop in Vienna, has it to give.

Torn from her parents during a time of war, she travels on the kindertransport trains, with her brave and protective brother out of Vienna to the United Kingdom, she ends up on a small Jewish refugee farm just outside Belfast. In poor Rosa's mind, she has been abandoned by her family, and even at her young age, she must find a depth that was not previously been there, in her innocent land of being a princess, now she has to be brave. And to her credit, she does.

#### FARAWAY HOME - The Story - Based on true events and a book by Marilyn Taylor:

A story that finds laughter even in the pain, 'Faraway Home is the gripping journey of two young Jewish children sent away by their parents from Nazi - occupied Austria via the Kindertransport to a refuge farm in Northern Ireland, smack in the middle of its own Irish/British, Catholic/Protestant troubles. As they begin to adjust to an Irish farm life mile from their parents and their families, German bombs hit Belfast and the war is brought back to their doorsteps.


